# Juniors Reap Awards At R2 Ranch Jackpot Futurity

Youth from across the state competed in the Third Annual R2 Ranch Red Brangus and Red Angus Junior Jackpot Futurity on April 24, 2004 at the Guadalupe Cattle Company facilities in New Braunfels, Texas. Females shown in the futurity were purchased from R2 Ranch.

Bruce Wied of El Campo, Texas showed the top entry with Ms R2 Goldie 403N. His trip to the grand champion circle netted him \$7,500 and a Gist buckle from R2 Ranch owner, Richard Luciano. Charolette Atkinson of Wharton, Texas showed the reserve grand champion with her entry Ms R2

Crusader 317N. She was awarded \$3,750 and a Gist buckle. Both Bruce and Charolette purchased their heifers in the 2003 R2 "Source For Success" Sale.

Division winners received \$500 while class winners earned \$100 and \$50 was given for second place class winners.

In the show-manship competition, Charolette Atkinson was selected champion showman and was presented a check for \$5,000 as well as a belt buckle.

Jim Williams of Wharton, Texas served as judge of the Jackpot Futurity and the showmanship contest.

### Down At The Ranch...

Well, as usual, things are really busy down here at the ranch. When people ask me how things are going I sometimes jokingly reply "wide open backwards!" Even though it seems like that at times, we are really doing very well. We are having an outstanding year of grass production and the cattle are fat and sassy. We had good rains in the spring and early summer. July and early August have been hot and dry, but what else can you expect in south Texas?

In mid July we weaned a set of calves that were born in November and December. We normally calve in September-October and again in February-March, but we had a winter breeding season last year as a transition to move most of our Red Brangus cows to spring calving and our Red Angus to fall calving. We are pleased with the weaning weights of these calves and how they are developing. Average actual weaning weight, without creep feed, was 608 pounds on the bulls and 572 pounds on the heifers. We do not creep our calves. We think that this gives us a better indication of the dam's milk production and how our calves will do in a real life situation since most commercial producers do not creep feed their calves either. We realize that when the weaning weights of our calves are compared with those of other breeders, ours might not be quite as high. However, we feel that this is the best way for us to develop our animals and obtain data that is meaningful in achieving our program goals.

Our primary goal in the registered cattle business is to produce good, functional seedstock for the commercial cattleman that will put money in his pocket. Since we show our bull calves and put so much effort into the junior show program, many people think that our main emphasis is on the show ring. This is not the case. Our program and our breeding decisions revolve around what is best

for the commercial cattleman. We feel like the show ring is a good medium for advertising and public exposure for our cattle. Just as important to us is helping youth through the show program.

Saturday, April 24, 2004 we had a really successful heifer futurity for the juniors. The Junior Jackpot, as we call it, is a great program for the kids. Judging this year's event was Jim Williams of Wharton, Texas. He did an outstanding job of working with the young exhibitors, both in the showmanship clinic and the heifer show. Although he is an outstanding cattle and showmanship judge, what I appreciated most was his obvious desire to help each young person in attendance. Not only did he strive to make each one a better exhibitor, he also encouraged self esteem and self worth as well. Not everyone can have the grand or reserve grand champion or be first in the showmanship, but with our program we feel that every exhibitor can go home feeling good about themselves and their animal. In our opinion, that's what the junior shows are all about and that's why R2 Ranch hosts the Junior Jackpot. Although there's a lot of prize money given away, it's more than just about the money. Our hat goes off to Jim and everyone else who made the '04 Junior Jackpot a great success. If you are the parent of a junior or know of a junior that wants to exhibit a good heifer, let them know about our sale on October 9. I sure hope you are making plans to attend our fourth annual "Source for Success" sale to be held October 9. As always, the cattle in this sale are as good as they come. They are from the first pick—not our leftovers. At last year's "Source for Success" sale we had more demand for commercial bulls than we had bulls selling. So this year we didn't sell any of our spring '03 bulls private treaty.

Instead they are being offered in this year's sale. We have also had much interest in young pairs and so this year we are offering an outstanding group of springing heifers bred for their first calf.
